The Fulbright Program is the United States' flagship foreign exchange program aimed at promoting mutual understanding through educational and cultural exchange.

Professor Tim Carey has recently returned to Central Australia after spending four months at the Center for Behavioral Health Innovation, Antioch University New England in the United States under a Fulbright Scholarship.

Professor Carey was motivated to undertake this project after his discovery of the lack of routine evaluation that occurs by health professionals and other service providers in remote communities.

In this relaxed and entertaining presentation, Professor Carey will describe his recent Fulbright experience, outline his motivation for the project, present his project results and discuss the implications of his Fulbright experience for remote health. Throughout the presentation Tim will provide some of the personal and professional highlights of the scholarship.

Tim Carey PhD, MAPS

Professor Tim Carey is Director of the Centre for Remote Health in Alice Springs. His research interests include topics concerning health services including access to services as well as flexible and responsive approaches to psychological treatments.

Tim has expertise in both quantitative and qualitative methodologies and has published work across a range of different approaches including systematic reviews, qualitative investigations, and program evaluations. He has over 100 publications including peer reviewed journal articles, books, and book chapters.

In addition to his PhD he has an MSc (Statistics) and a Postgraduate Certificate in Biostatistics. He has served on Grant Review Panels for the NHMRC since 2011 and, for for the last two years, he has been a member of the Indigenous Grant Review Panel.
